Walking along the banks of Lake St Clair in central Tasmania, where the mist rolls over the glassy water and the land underfoot is strewn with the washed grey detritus of high waters passed, I was struck by the contrasts before me. The Pump House across the water appears as an exclamation mark, drawing the eye but at the same time providing perspective for the vastness and depth of the ranges behind. "Leeawulenna" or sleeping water, is the lake's name, timeless, eternal in its slumber and the Pump House tells of mans passing folly and insignificance in this magical place.



I'm driving the highway home from Hobart to Queenstown and after four hours I reach the Blowhard Gap. It's a 'threshold' to a vast landscape space which opens up to the west. Those final minutes down those twists in the road, through a landscape radically changed by a century of copper mining, is always a kaleidoscopic experience. It's partly to do with the 'trance state' after hours at the wheel, and a lot to do with a reciprocation of view through micro and macro spaces. That guard rail before the drop, the water rushing down the chasm, the light on the distant sea etc. And then there is more! In the imaginary time and space unfolding there are seventeenthcentury Dutch navigators, indigenous migrations across millennia and explorers searching for mineralised ground.



The experience is a type of 'giving up' of individual consciousness and channelling the universal experience of others - Into the setting sun! Across the poisoned landscape! To history! To something like death! 'Death and the Past, came up the well-known road And bathed my heart with tears, but stirr'd my mind.'

As I graduated from the school of fine arts, I watched my country disintegrate due to war. Every day we got used to hear about loss of lives and destruction. The impact of war is devastating with unimaginable trauma and pain to all sides. However, no one talks about its universal impact. What happens in one place affects all other regions. We do not have walls between countries. We are interconnected by wind, water, earth, and trees. War is a massive driver of the destruction of nature and its severe cost to the climate is often ignored. I have moved to Tasmania with my husband, and when our baby daughter was born, we visited Ben Lomond National Park. The experience was overwhelming, and I was awestruck by the varieties of colours and shapes amidst shifting



patterns of light and shadow. It was like stepping into a new dream-reality. As a mother holding her newborn the idea of this work was the result of an urge for a prayer to keep Tasmania safe and pure for our future generations. What would the world look like if we see it from a Tasmanian prism?

Big Country Nostalgia Acrylic on canvas 134 x 164 cm \$14.850

Nestled amidst the vast expanse of Tasmania's big country on the Midlands Highway, adjacent to the historic town of Ross an aging once grand shearing shed, a testament to a bygone era now sits in serene decay bearing witness to the passage of time. Originally constructed as a shearing shed for Chiswick circa 1823 believed to have been the first house built in Ross, it once echoed with lively activity which also included B&S balls in the 1930s - 1940s. In my painting I sought to capture the mystery and essence of this fading relic blending artistry with history to immortalise a visual narrative before its reference is lost forever.



My depiction aims to evoke a sense of nostalgia for a time that once thrived within those weathered walls.

In 2015, I went in search of a landscape that I briefly glimpsed on an ABC news report. The water level at Lake Gordon had fallen by 45 meters and a drowned forest had been revealed. It appeared to be an extraordinary scene of tree wreckage and this previously logged forest now stood in the daylight. It was a chaotic spectacle that immediately appealed to me. I thought of Paul Nash and his paintings of WW1 battlefields. In those familiar pictures everything too was blasted and shredded. It was brutal but also beautiful. I visited the shores of Lake Gordon many times over this period and came to feel that the power of this place had something to do with the gulf between the underwater world and this new reality; time slowed underwater



but now the daylight illuminated and exposed, time sped up. As the water slowly retreated It was an extreme and unusual landscape that was revealed.



The evolution of this piece emerged from encounters with texts, travel guides, and journals, unveiling the distressing history of women transported across the alobe for seeminaly trivial offenses.John Glover's idealised landscapes, characterised by a subtle palette of natural colours, served as a catalyst for my own visual narrative, seeking to manipulate the truth of this colonial history from the perspective of a new Australian. Through a meticulous combination of pencil, ink, acrylic paint, gouache, and period wallpaper on board, I aimed to create a work that is stoic, still, and remarkably beautiful. The undulating background, reminiscent of the waves of the convicts' journey, the floating dress, a poignant symbol taken from

the story of Maria Swinchatt, and the "forget-me-not" flower tattoos worn by the female convicts echo the profound injustice faced by women in a society grappling with its own demons. "Port Arthur Echoes" is not merely a visual representation but, a reflective exploration of Tasmania's past. It questions the transformation of a prison into a tourist location, prompting viewers to contemplate the delicate balance between remembering the past and moving forward. In this piece, I offer a visual narrative that delves deep into the historical echoes of Port Arthur and other facilities, weaving together the threads of colonial history, societal norms, and the resilience of those who endured.

Artist Statement

My paintings are cinematic in scope, reminiscent of early colonial coastal cartographic surveys. Many containing messages and references at first hidden, but on closer scrutiny tell a more involved narrative. Working across painting and collage I combine formal painting techniques with newsprint and images from journals and magazines. I am influenced by the stories and conversations I encounter.

In my Life Landscape commissions I work collaboratively with individuals, institutions, families and organizations to create bespoke pieces reflecting their history and story.

After the Rain, Murky Waters Where Platypuses Roam

Collage, natural dyes, pastel acrylic on paper 50 x 100 cm \$6,600

Living in West Hobart I am fortunate to be able to walk along the rivulet several times a week. Sometimes the water is calm and clear, other times murky water rages over the creek bed. Here a most unusual creature lives: the semi aquatic, duck billed, egg laying platypus. This work goes beyond the visual, using processes to create a sensory image of the waters that the platypuses live in where they do not use sight or smell to feed but use their electroreceptors. On my walks I often collect vegetation, this combined with mordants is used the extract dyes for my work. Several sheets of paper are submerged into the dye baths until I get a richness of tones and movement and the plants leave traces of their shapes. After drying the paper pastel and acrylics are added.



Finally, I collage the fragments revealing sensory aspects of the rivulet, my walks and maybe something of the platypus' habitat. This work pays homage to the platypus. While not immediately threatened by extinction, habitat destruction through land clearing, climate change and dam building could easily put them on the vulnerable list.

My encounter with Tasmania's pristine wilderness in January 2023 became a catalyst for exploring its historical echoes, juxtaposed with the colonial trauma embedded in its landscapes. This ancient land of the Big River Nation stages a haunting mise en scène in which the disconnected telephone prompts feelings of ambivalence and futility. Drawing inspiration from Salvador Dalis portrayal of war in "Mountain Lake," 1938, I channel the visceral language of paint and multimedia to weave a narrative that transcends geographical boundaries.

'Wynyard' is based on a trip to Tasmania in July, 2023, where I stayed near the rocky cliffs and dark blue water along Freestone Cove. I perceive landscapes as both physical and psychological, where existing thoughts and experiences are contrasted against new scenes. I was taking in this vast cold space and all of its small details - burnt-out tree trunks, stippling on rocks and the waves splitting on the cliffs. I was thinking about my partner at the time, trying to be alone, and moving between moments of clarity and total overwhelm. The time away showed me new things - not necessarily answers, but a clear vision of 'you and I' as the posts that hold a landscape of details, distance, memories and movement between two people.



I drove from Hobart to Freycinet in the hope of walking to the Isthmus track and doing some painting there not realising it was closed on that day for 'annual track maintenance'. Even though I never got to the Isthmus this painting came from that day's walk. I guess I was overcome by the complexity of such a subject, the rhythm and movement of the branches and the compelling nature of the shadows across the track ahead. I also responded to the raw quality of the track, carved through the bush in a way that is authentic and not manicured like much of our "wilderness experiences" are prescribed for us these days. But above all it was the formal challenge of capturing the nuance and complexity of the light as it plays across the landscape that interests me.

This work is the latest in a series responding to my time off the wild south east coast of Bruny Island (Lunawanna - Allonah) in the Autumn of 2023. The treacherous seas and high winds plunged me into a tumultuous engagement with the elements and whilst being in the relatively safe environment of a modern boat designed for the conditions it still challenged my perception of my physical existence in the world. As a correlation, considering the endangered status of the Tasmanian Swift Parrot, not a good move for these birds to venture out into the elements on this day to begin; after the summer breeding season; their migration for winter in South Australia and Victoria.



They are, it turns out, heading out to the open sea away from the mainland, disorientated by the storm. Life is a precarious business when faced with the unmitigated vicissitudes of the natural environment.

I have long embraced the philosophy of kintsugi, that beauty lies in imperfection. It has helped me better accept my own obvious scars and inspired my practice of reinterpreting fragility, destruction, interruption and repair. Bushfire is one of nature's greatest 're-sets', and Tasmania's lush landscape has not been exempt from the challenge of change it inflicts, rejuvenation of country it inspires and reinvention of community it compels. In this piece, the recent Dolphin Sands fires and destruction at Coles Bay are interpreted with symbolism and the sentiment of kintsugi. It proposes that the delicately poised, fire ravaged and clearly scared landscape, having succumb to a monochromatic, chaotic version of its former self with immediate, obvious attempts at repair need not be



viewed through a lens of lament but rather one focused on the undeniably captivating, interesting and integrally still beautiful image that remains. From the ashes of Dolphin Sands and Coles Bay a reinvention will transpire. A reinvention of both the landscape and the people so reliant upon it and connected to it. A slow, confronting undertaking, courageously seeking to eclipse our previous memories of its lush, largely unblemished and familiar former self.



I made the decision to relocate to Tasmania, driven by the desire to immerse myself in one of the world's most breathtaking landscapes. Little did I anticipate the profound impact that would occur between myself and the ancient river systems of the takayna / Tarkine region. In the misty predawn hours of a winter's day, my husband and I set out in our kayak along the isolated waterways of the Savage River. As a person originating from Barbados, this rugged environment presented a stark contrast to my upbringing. However, as the sun rose, casting its gentle light upon the cool temperate rainforest of myrtle and pine trees, a sense of reverence and ancient wisdom descended upon the river, creating space for growth and self reflection.



'Long Way From Home' serves not only as a visual record of that transcendent moment but also invites the viewer into the perennial nature of the river. It captures the paradox of its simultaneous permanence and fragility, prompting contemplation on our collective responsibility towards the environment. Through this painting, I hope to initiate a

dialogue that encourages a deeper connection with our surroundings, fostering a greater understanding of the delicate balance we must uphold.



Much of my work explores the themes of Sovereignty, Legacy and Memory. I make use of antique furniture and bric-abrac, old homesteads, birds and native animals to weave narratives of the landscape and to ponder the spaces we, along with our Colonial legacy, fit within this rapidly changing world. I specifically use endangered and extinct native species to highlight the ideas of balance and equity- the impacts on the natural environmental and on climate as we progress and proliferate. In this work I have depicted the Miena Cider Gum - a critically endangered eucalypt found only around the central plateau town of Miena, and the Forty Spotted Pardalote - also critically endangered, now only found in the wilds of Maria Island. Both of these species' numbers have dwindled due to human activity and both face uncertain futures.



In the painting, the tree and the birds appear in an altered environment – the imagery speaks of displacement and what that means, not only for endangered species, but for all of us.







"The Bacchanal" serves not only as a commentary on the consequences of climate inaction but also as a call to re-evaluate our relationship with the Tasmanian wilderness, urging a collective shift toward more mindful and sustainable practices.

My encaustic wax painting "Dawn of the Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo" is inspired by the raw beauty, freedom, and individuality of the Tasmanian landscape as a touching metaphor for our melancholic yellow-tailed black cockatoo. Harnessing its fluidity, I use layers of molten wax manipulated with a heat gun and blow torch to create an interplay of black, white, and yellow, that mirrors the soft hues of dawn and the haunting clouds that echo the cockatoos' appearance and demeanour. The landscape style allows molten wax to transform into ethereal skies and undulating waters, while a more solid, sculpted wax forms the elements of the land, creating contrast and tranquillity. "Dawn of the Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo" beckons the observer to reflect upon the beauty inherent





This work representing Cape Pillar is part of an ongoing series of headlands by the artist. Watts has painted Sydney Heads numerous times in his career. Inspired by the internationally famous Sydney to Hobart race Watts connects these two important entrances. Cape Pillar is a famous backdrop used in many images of the Yacht race not least in Rolex advertising. The Albatross too connects the image to the classic romantic sublime. As part heroic yacht race part natural sublime this image puts the lever on western tropes of the seascape. It is on one hand earnest and representational and on the other a response to the televisual and the mediated landscape, from newspapers to fashion magazines.

competitions worldwide.



The attention of the artist is repeatedly drawn to the beauty and aggression of nature, and finds within themselves the yearning to capture it on canvas/ paper/board. The seeming permanence of the rocks, so monolithic, juxtaposed with minute particles of glittering sand created in aeons past by the relentless tides, battering the hostile jagged rocks into the sandy beaches we delight in exploring. We observe the violence of this battle, not perceiving the minuscule changes which shape our coast. Within this scene, we live and play, leaving our own changes upon the shore, creating our own battles within nature; however, our presence does not go unnoticed. I have sought to describe this delicate balance of our coastal fringe, by separating the painting into connected, yet disconnected imagery.



It is mounted so as to cast shadows upon the backing board, symbolic of the shadows the human race casts upon the fragile natural surroundings.
